Rita Dove is the Commonwealth Professor of English at the University of Virginia. She won the Pulitzer Prize for Poetry in 1987 and was Poet Laureate of the United States from 1993 through 1995. A canonical figure in American and African American literature, Dove is known for her interdisciplinarity and collaborative ventures with composers, musicians, and other artists. 


