

THOMAS J. J. ALTIZER was the subject of this infamous Time magazine cover and the firestorm that followed. Altizer's progressive New Testament theology was frequently misunderstood or oversimplified, but his scholarship attracted national attention. Altizer taught religion at Emory from 1956 until 1968, when he left to teach English at the State University of New York at Stony Brook. In 2006 he published a memoir in which

he noted Emory's support of his work.

I became persuaded that a new

theological ground could be discovered by way of a voyage to the East.
