

as the Lord of Misrule and Chief Mischief Maker, Dooley can release classes early. Dooley appears at many campus events, including the Carter Town Hall and, most prominently, during Dooley's Week.

**FUN FACT 2:** The DUC features three ATMS, with several banking options available.

**15. Residence Halls.** All first-year students live in residence halls. Each floor has three live-in upperclass advisers: the resident adviser, usually a junior or senior in the college, and two sophomore advisers who help students adjust to life at Emory. Throughout the year residence life staff develop programming to foster community life. Ethernet connections are provided in each room as are cable television outlets and phone service. Housing is guaranteed for two years. After the first year, students can choose from a variety of housing options including suites, apartments, and singles. More than 60 percent of undergraduates live on campus.

**FUN FACT 1:** Each of the residence halls in the new freshman housing village offers a unique theme. The programs are developed through a partnership between Residence Life and the Office of Undergraduate Education. Turman Hall is home to "Citizenship Living-Learning Community," Few and Evans halls are the "Living Green" experience, and Longstreet-Means (opening in fall 2010) will feature a "Global Cultures" theme.

**FUN FACT 2:** Upperclassmen have multiple options for housing including several options of floor plans, themed houses, and the Clairmont Campus.

**16. George W. Woodruff Physical Education Center** (referred to by the abbreviation WoodPEC, and pronounced "woodpeck"). Access to the building is limited to students, faculty, and staff. When you enter, please inform the attendant that you are a prospective student and would like to look around. Emory's sports motto, "Athletics for All," suitably notes the involvement of almost 80 percent of Emory students in varsity, club, and intramural sports. Eighteen men's and women's varsity teams at Emory compete in the NCAA Division III University Athletic Association. WoodPEC includes a basketball, tennis and racquetball courts, a dance studio, a cardiotheater, an indoor track, rock-climbing walls, an Olympic-size swimming pool, weight machines, and free weights. A soccer field, an additional track, and tennis courts are located outside.

**FUN FACT 1:** Emory is just one of five schools in the nation to place in the top twenty in both the NACDA Director's Cup for best all-around athletics program and the U.S. News & World Report rankings of best national universities.

**FUN FACT 2:** In 2010 the Emory Women's Swim Team won the NCAA Division III National Championship, bringing Emory's total national championship titles to 11.

**17. Tull Plaza.** This gathering place is informally referred to as Energy Plaza, since a main energy plant is located underneath. The departments of Political Science and Sociology are located in Tarbutton Hall, the Anthropology department is in the Anthropology Building and the Modern Languages Building houses the departments of Linguistics, German, and Russian and East Asian Languages and Cultures (REALC).

**18. Cannon Chapel.** Designed by Paul Rudolph, Cannon Chapel is the site of various weekly religious services. Emory has been affiliated with the Methodist Church since the school's founding in 1836. Today students from many religious backgrounds practice their faiths on campus. Most major world religions have representation on campus through student organizations and campus religious leaders.

## Academics

**19. Goodrich C. White Hall.** Home to Emory's auditorium-style lecture halls. Although the average class size at Emory is nineteen, classes may range from a one-on-one independent study to a lecture course with a hundred students. Large lecture classes divide into smaller discussion groups and labs. Ninety-nine percent of Emory's faculty hold the highest degree in their respective fields. With scheduled office hours each week, professors are accessible to students.

**FUN FACT:** LearnLink is Emory's online community. It's an easy way to connect with campus, to explore class offerings, clubs, sports, and organizations, and to chat with current students and professors.

**20. Cherry Logan Emerson Hall and Sanford S. Atwood Chemistry Center.** Home to the Department of Chemistry, these buildings contain laboratories, classrooms, and the Science Library. Emerson Hall was completed in 2001.

**21. Psychology and Interdisciplinary Sciences Building.** Emory's newest classroom building consolidates the Psychology Department's teaching and research into one central facility and allows faculty to work near the physical science departments to create a "science commons" area on campus. The building is Gold LEED (Leadership in Energy and Environmental Design) certified. It's home to a lecture hall, classrooms, seminar rooms, a computer lab, a Child Studies Center, a neuroimaging center, and various research laboratories.

**22. Mathematics and Science Center.** Completed in 2002, this facility houses the Computer Science, Environmental Science, Mathematics, and Physics departments. The building contains a planetarium, a telescope, office space, classrooms, and laboratories.

**FUN FACT:** Emory has more than 77 majors and 58 minors. More than half of students are dual majors or have a major and a minor.

### Emory History

Emory College was founded in Oxford, Georgia, thirty-eight miles east of Atlanta in 1836. The college was named for John Emory, an early nineteenth-century Methodist bishop of Maryland and proponent of education. In 1914 Asa Candler, then president of The Coca-Cola Company, gave Emory College a gift of \$1 million and seventy-five acres in Druid Hills, and the college moved from Oxford to Atlanta.

The original campus exists today as Oxford College, an undergraduate option at Emory distinctive by virtue of its smaller student body (850 students) and small-town location. Students who attend Oxford College complete their first two years of undergraduate education there and their last two on Emory's Atlanta campus.

It was another gift, this time in 1979, that fueled Emory's meteoric rise among American colleges and universities. Brothers George and Robert Woodruff donated \$105 million

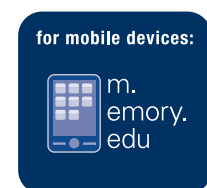

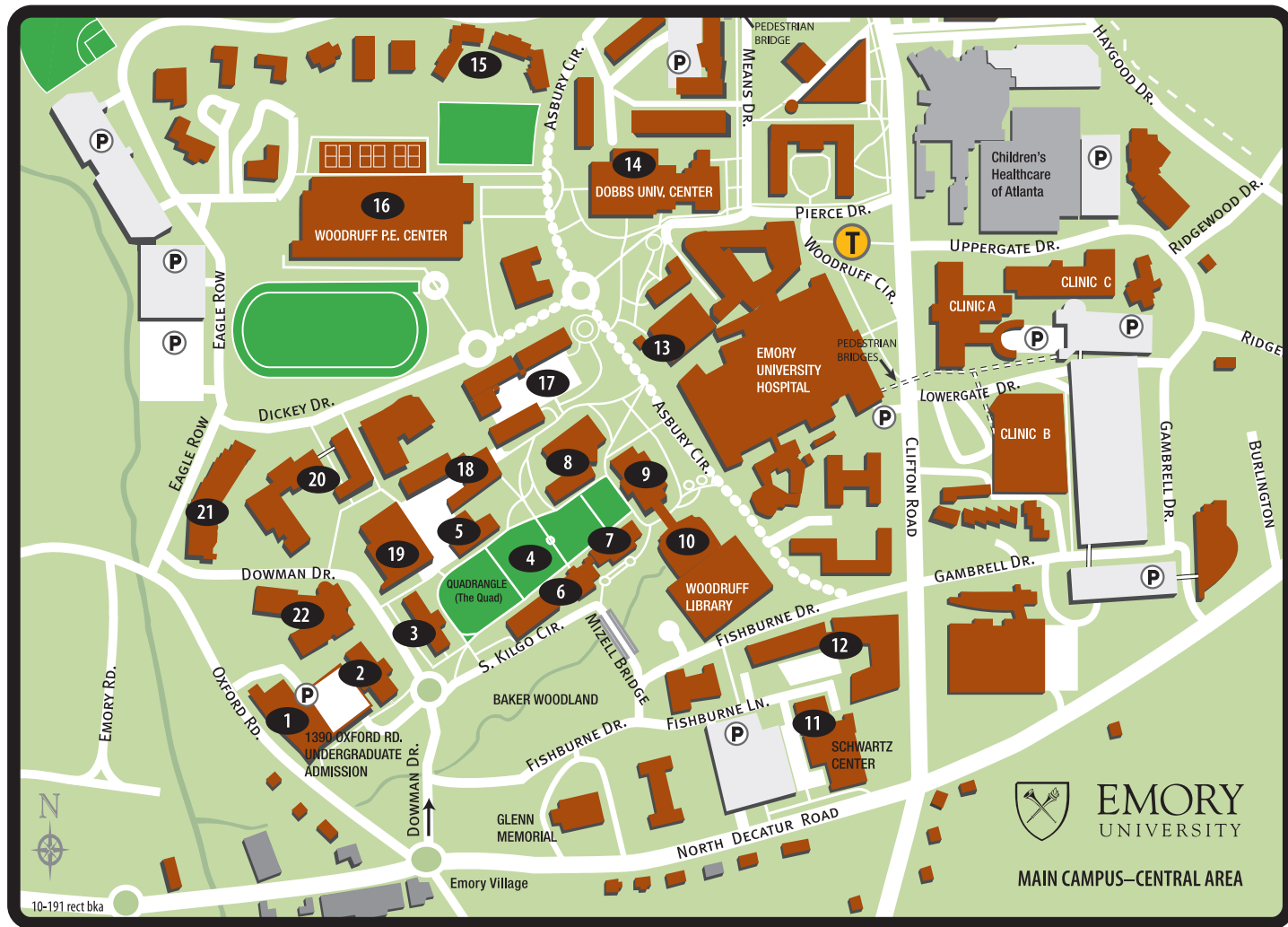

in Coca-Cola Company stock to Emory. As you tour, you will note that it is difficult, if not impossible, to find that 'other soda' on Emory's campus.

The University has wisely used its resources to attract talented faculty and students. Emory's commitment to sustainability means preserving or creating new green space; providing areas that invite interaction among students, faculty, and staff; maintaining a pedestrian-friendly environment; and promoting sustainable practices in campus dining and in building construction.





## Campus Tour

**1. Oxford Road Building.** The Oxford Road Building opened in the summer of 2010, giving additional space for the Office of Undergraduate Admission, the bookstore, and a café. The building features both a presentation room as well as a large living room that provides space for communal events.

**FUN FACT 1:** The Oxford Road Building is home to the largest Starbucks on any college campus.

**FUN FACT 2:** Emory Village is accessible to students and only a ten-minute walk from any of the first-year residence halls and only five minutes from the Office of Admission. The village has a wide array of facilities including several local restaurants such as Everybody's Pizza, Sprouts Green Café, Falafel King, Wonderful World of Burgers & More, and Rise n' Dine, along with chains such as Panara Bread, Doc Chey's, and Starbucks. There is also a boutique and a twenty-four hour CVS pharmacy.

**2. Boisfeuillet Jones Center** (pronounced BO-fill-lay). The building honors Boisfeuillet Jones 34C 37L and his lifetime dedication to Emory, to higher education, and to public service. A graduate of Emory College and the School of Law, Jones served the University as a professor and administrator, among many other endeavors. The center houses the offices of Financial Aid, Student Financial Services, and Student Records as well as the Career Center.

**FUN FACT:** Transportation on and off campus is available to students through MARTA (Metropolitan Atlanta Rapid Transit Authority), Cliff shuttles, and Zipcars. Notice the Cliff Shuttle stop as you cross Dowman Drive. While first-year students are not allowed to have cars on campus, parking is available for other students for an annual fee. The University provides additional special event shuttles for students such as Emory Experience shuttles and Dooley Direct shuttles.

**3. The Administration Building.** Across the street from the B. Jones Center and defining the west end of the Quadrangle, the Administration Building houses the Office of the President (Dr. James W. Wagner), the Office of Disability Services, the Office of Finance, the Graduate School of Arts and Sciences, the Office of the General Counsel, and the Provost's Office.

**FUN FACT:** President Wagner holds office hours on a regular basis and has monthly lunches with students.

**4. The Quadrangle.** The Quad is the heart of Emory. On a sunny day it is not unusual to see classes meeting here under the trees, students studying, people enjoying their lunches, and the occasional game of Frisbee. The rolling hills of Georgia reminded Henry Hornbostel, Emory's original campus architect, of northern Italy. Thus, the Quadrangle buildings were constructed in a modern Italianate style, out of pink and gray Georgian marble.

Three of these buildings, Pitts Theology Library, Carlos Hall, and Callaway Center are the oldest on campus and were completed in 1919.

## Buildings on the Quad

**5. Pitts Theology Library.** This library houses more than 550,000 volumes and is the third-largest theological library in United States. It is also one of the best places to study on campus.

**6. Carlos Hall and Michael C. Carlos Museum.** Originally the School of Law, Carlos Hall now houses the Department of Art History and portions of the museum. Michael Graves designed the interior renovation of Carlos Hall and the main museum structure. The Carlos Museum houses a collection of ancient art and archaeological objects from the Mediterranean region, Asia, and the New World. Museum hours are Tuesday through Saturday, 10:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. and Sunday, noon to 4:00 p.m. If you want to take a break, the museum's Caffè Antico is a great place to eat.

**FUN FACT:** The Carlos Museum is the one of the largest university museums in the Southeast.

**7. Henry L. Bowden Hall.** Named after the chairman of the Board of Trustees and attorney who defended Emory's right to integrate against the State of Georgia's wishes. Bowden Hall houses the History and Philosophy departments.

**8. Loula Walker and Ely Reeves Callaway Sr. Memorial Center.** Named after the prominent Emory alumnus of Callaway Golf fame, the Callaway Center provides office and classroom space for numerous departments in the humanities including Classics, English, Literature, Creative Writing, Journalism, Spanish, French, Italian, Middle Eastern Studies, and Religion.

**FUN FACT:** Emory's education is grounded in the liberal arts and emphasizes thoughtful inquiry through collaboration. With an average class size of just 19 students, and a student to faculty ratio of 7:1, the faculty continually provide outstanding support to students through advising (PACE: Pre-major Advising and Connections at Emory), research, and engagement with the community.

## The Libraries

**9. Candler Library.** Built in 1926 and named for Asa Candler, Candler Library was renovated in 2002. The library holds a large reading room for students as well as offices for Emory College. Take special note of the plaster frieze in the reading room, titled "The Triumph of Alexander." It was rediscovered in the building's attic during the renovation. (Access to the reading room is available only through the Woodruff Library.)

**10. Woodruff Library.** Access to Woodruff Library is restricted to students, faculty, and staff. When you enter, please inform the attendant you are a prospective student and would like to look around. The tenth floor observation deck provides a wonderful view of the campus and surrounding city. Woodruff is the largest of Emory's nine libraries and serves the teaching and research needs of Emory College. The library is named for Robert Woodruff, renowned for his lifetime leadership of The Coca-Cola Company and as Emory's greatest benefactor. In total, Emory's libraries

contain more than 3.5 million volumes. The collection, along with electronic resources, provides seemingly limitless information for students.

**11. Schwartz Center for Performing Arts.** Opened in 2002, the Schwartz Center provides a central space for Emory's music, theater, and dance programs and includes a world-class, 825-seat concert hall; a theater lab; and a dance studio. Each of these spaces is designed to encourage student learning as well as to inspire professional performance and the development of new work.

**FUN FACT:** Each year the seven Emory College arts departments and programs (music, theater, dance, film, creative writing, visual arts, and art history) present more than 250 arts events, the majority of which are free for students and open to the public.

**12. Goizueta Business School** (pronounced goy-SWET-uh). The Goizueta Business School building was completed in 1997 and features state-of-the-art classrooms and technology. A second building, completed in 2005, houses the business school's PhD program. The school was named in honor of Roberto C. Goizueta, a former chair and CEO of The Coca-Cola Company. The business school also houses its own computer lab, Career Management Center, and International Programs office.

**FUN FACT 1:** The BBA Program office runs tours and information sessions on Mondays and Fridays at 3:30 p.m. To schedule a tour, call 404.727.8106.

**FUN FACT 2:** BBA students only have class Monday through Thursday with Friday left for group work, networking, internships, informational interviewing, and other activities.

**13. Cox Hall.** Located on the ground floor, the Cox Hall food court is one of the primary dining options on campus and another great place to stop for lunch. The food court was completely renovated in 2006 and features Chick-fil-A, Pizza Hut, Freshens, a Mexican restaurant, a salad bar, a smoothie bar, a bakery, and more. The second floor houses a state-of-the-art computer lab, which is one of the best places on campus for students to socialize and work. Cox Hall's landmark clock tower plays Emory's *Alma Mater* each day at noon.

**14. Dobbs University Center** (referred to by its initials, DUC, and called "the duck"). The R. Howard Dobbs University Center typifies the blending of the old and new at Emory. An addition is attached to the facade of the old student center, providing a dramatic gathering space for the Emory community, the Coca-Cola Commons. With its dining hall and a central meeting spaces, the DUC is at the heart of campus as a place where faculty, staff, and students gather throughout the day. The Coke Commons is a great place to meet and talk with current students. In addition, the DUC houses banking services, office space for student organizations, a theater, a cinema, a game room, Einstein's Bagels, an information and ticket desk, and Campus Life offices (for some of Emory's 300+ student organizations).

**FUN FACT 1:** Emory has two mascots: Swoop and Dooley. Dooley is Emory's unofficial mascot and is considered the "Spirit of Emory." The legend of Dooley goes back to 1899, when Emory was still based on the Oxford campus. No one knows Dooley's identity, who chooses or contacts his escorts, or who arranges transportation for him, but,
