



*John Bugge* is Professor Emeritus of English and the Chair of the Executive Committee of the Emory University Emeritus College. Bugge assisted Eugene Bianchi in founding the College in 2001 and served briefly in 2012 as its Interim Director. He retired in September of 2011 from the Department of English at Emory, having been its principal specialist in medieval English literature for over four decades. For 15 years, Bugge served as the President of the Emory Chapter of the American Association of University Professors. He received his B.A. from Marquette University, his M.A. and Ph.D. from Harvard University, and was the recipient of a Fulbright Scholarship to Germany and a Danforth Graduate Fellowship.



*Donna Brogan* is Professor Emerita of Biostatistics and Bioinformatics in the Rollins School of Public Health (RSPH) and recently joined the Executive Committee of the Emeritus College. She retired in 2004 after being an Emory faculty member for 33 years, first in the School of Medicine, and later in the new RSPH, being its first female full professor and first female departmental chair. Brogan received many honors, including election as a fellow of the American Statistical Association and distinguished alumni awards from Gettysburg College (B. A. in math), Purdue University (M.S. in statistics, and Iowa State University (Ph.D. in statistics). Her statistical specialty is the design and analysis of health surveys, and in retirement she continues to teach workshops on this topic for public health researchers. Another major interest is challenge level square dancing, which relies heavily upon mathematics and a good memory.



*Patricia "Pat" Douglass* retired in 2004 as Assistant Vice President of Human Resources for the University. As a member of the Executive Committee, Douglass volunteers to help coordinate EUEC events/activities, e.g., the annual Retirement Seminar Series and Women's Conversations. While in Human Resources Douglass was responsible for various units including Employee Relations, Training and Development, Benefits and Records. She annually organized the "Employee of Distinction" award and Staff Day. In 2002, Douglas was named an "Unsung Heroine" by the Center for Women at Emory and was chair of its Advisory Board in 2007. She received her B.S. from Middle Tennessee State University.



*Nathaniel "Nat" Gozansky* is Professor Emeritus of Law. He retired in 2012 from Emory School of Law after 45 years of service. Nearly a third of that time, Gozansky served as the Associate Dean for Academic Affairs. While at Emory, he served on the University Senate, was a President of the campus AAUP, and served on a variety of Law School and University committees. During his tenure, Gozansky visited seven different universities and devoted much of his administrative efforts to building the School of Law's "international footprint." Prior to coming to Emory, Gozansky taught at Vanderbilt University. He has degrees from Florida State University, University of Miami, and Yale University.



*Jon Gunnemann* is Professor of Social Ethics Emeritus and Chair of the Teaching and Lecturing Committee. He retired from Candler School of Theology and the Graduate Division of Religion in 2008, having served as Director of the Graduate Division of Religion from 1992-1998. Prior to coming to Emory in 1981, Gunnemann taught at Pennsylvania State University and Yale University. He has been a Visiting Professor at Uppsala University, Sweden and has been a Fellow at Doshisha University, Kyoto, Japan, Harvard University, and Cambridge University. Gunnemann received his A.B. from Harvard; his B.D. from United Theological Seminary of the Twin Cities, and his M.A. and Ph.D. from Yale University.



*James "Jim" Keller* is Professor Emeritus, Emory University School of Medicine. He retired in 2009 from the Department of Radiation Oncology where he was Associate Chairman of Clinical Affairs. For 12 years ('95-'07), Keller served as Chairman of the Emory University IRB. He received a BS, MSc, and an MD from Marquette University and trained at Johns Hopkins, Washington University, and University of Rochester. Keller is boarded in three specialties. He is the Emeritus College Representative for the Faculty Council and University Senate, and he also serves on the Fringe Benefits Committee, a term that expires in 2015.



*Clark Lemons* is Professor of English and Director of the Theater at Oxford College of Emory University. Lemons received an MA in Liberal Arts at St. John's College, a M.Div. at Union Theological Seminary, and a Ph.D. in English at Emory. At Oxford for over 30 years, Lemons is Faculty Marshal, a long-time member of the Faculty Advisory Committee, past member of the University Senate and Faculty Council, and active in promoting faculty governance. Lemons has received many awards for excellence in teaching. His current scholarly interest is theater and religious communities of the medieval period. Most of his time is spent directing especially social issue plays and teaching undergraduates.

*Helen S. O'Shea* is Professor Emeritus of Nursing and Chair of the Honors and Awards Committee of the Emory University Emeritus College. O'Shea received her diploma in nursing from the Martins Ferry Hospital School of Nursing in 1958, her BSN and MS from the Ohio State University in 1961 and 1962 respectively, and her PhD from Georgia State University in 1980. She served as a faculty member and an administrator at the Nell Hodgson Woodruff School of Nursing at Emory University for 40 years. She retired in August 2003, but continued to teach part time in the doctoral program and in the post-master's summer teaching institute until 2011. O'Shea is active in the Emeritus College service activities and is an active DeKalb County Master Gardener. As a result of her service to Emory and the Emory community, O'Shea received the Distinguished Emeritus Award from the Emeritus College in 2011 and the Unsung Heroine Award from the Emory Women's Center in 2013.



*James "Jim" Rosenfeld* is an Associate Professor of Finance. Prior to joining the Goizueta Business School faculty, Rosenfeld taught at the Graduate Business School at the University of Georgia. He received his Ph.D. from New York University, his M.B.A. from Columbia University, and B.A. from the Wharton Business School at the University of Pennsylvania. He recently completed two studies on the usage of trust preferred securities by banks and industrial corporations. He is currently investigating the price performance of sponsored spin-offs, a divestiture strategy that is gaining wide-spread popularity. Rosenfeld's papers have been published in the *Journal of Finance*, *Journal of Financial Economics*, *Journal of Financial and Quantitative Analysis*, *Journal of Financial Research*, *Managerial and Decision Economics*, *The Accounting Review*, *Financial Management*, and the *Journal of Money Credit and Banking*. *Marianne Scharbo-Dehaan* is Professor Emeritus of Nursing. She is a member of the Emeritus College Executive Committee and Chair of the Emeritus College Service Committee. Scharbo-Dehaan retired from the School of Nursing in 2000, having spent 18 years on the graduate faculty of the Nurse Midwifery Program and Women's Health. Following retirement from Emory, she joined the Centers for Disease Control (CDC) where she served as Section Chief in the Training and Health Communications Branch in the Center for STD Prevention. Following retirement from the CDC in 2005, Scharbo-Dehaan served as a CDC contractor conducting community assessments in Ethiopia and South Africa. She received her MS and Nurse Midwifery Certificate from Emory and her Ph.D. from Georgia State University. In her spare time, she is a Master Gardener and a Docent for Trees Atlanta on the Beltline Arboretum.
