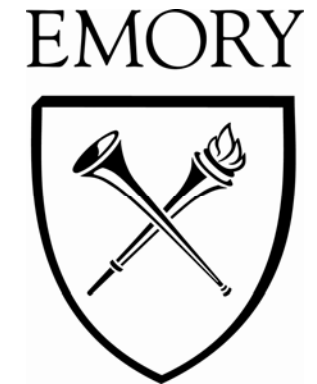

Presenters

SURABHI AGRAWAL (08OX, 10C) is a sophomore at Oxford College and is an International Studies and Religion major with a concentration in Arabic. Since her freshman year, she has been involved in many volunteer activities, including Chair of Habitat for Humanity, Campus Team Coordinator for Relay for Life 07 and 08, Toys for Tots Collection Drive Organizer, TPSL: Head Start volunteer, and TPSL: Child Day Care volunteer teaching Spanish. She also participated in Freshman Seminar, Into the Street: Riverdale Nursing Home and Reading Fair in Convington, GA and organized Mini Gandhi Day, 2007.

DANIEL BELLWARE (07C) graduated with a joint major in Sociology and Religion. He participated in the Tibetan Studies program in Dharamsala, India in Spring, 2006, where he did research on the impact of culture, religion, and tourism on the response to HIV/AIDS in the Tibetan Exile Community. He served as program coordinator for HIV/AIDS through Volunteer Emory, and on the planning committee for the AIDS Quilt Project. While at Emory, Daniel interned at the Atlanta Community Food Bank, was a Community Building and Social Change Fellow at Refugee Family Services, and was a consultant for the Division of Developmental Disabilities at Jewish Family and Career Services. Daniel is currently Donor Relations Manager for Jerusalem House, Atlanta's largest provider of permanent, supportive housing for homeless individuals and families affected by HIV/AIDS.

ROBERT L. DEHAAN is Sr. Science Advisor, Division of Educational Studies, and Charles H. Candler Professor of Cell Biology Emeritus at Emory, and Director of Education Research for the India, China, America Institute in Atlanta. His research career spans four decades on the faculties of the Carnegie Institution of Washington, the Johns Hopkins University, and the Emory School of Medicine and College of Arts and Sciences. He was Founding Director of the Elementary Science Education Partners (ESEP) program, an NSF-supported science education outreach effort with Atlanta Public Schools, and served as a committee director with the Center for Education of the National Research Council/National Academies. At Emory, DeHaan was twice named Outstanding Teacher of the Year, received the University's highest faculty accolade, the Thomas Jefferson Award in 1998, and the Distinguished Emeritus Award in 2006. He received the first Bruce Alberts Award from the American Society of Cell Biologists for Distinguished Contributions to Science Education (1998), and was awarded the Viktor Hamburger Outstanding Educator Prize from the Society for Developmental Biology (2006). He is a Fulbright Scholar, a Macy Scholar and a lifetime Fellow of the AAAS.

DANIEL DENTON (09C) is a junior at Emory College majoring in International Studies. He has been an active volunteer since high school and began volunteering with Volunteer Emory during his freshman year. Along with Becca Cutts (09), he will serve as co-director of Volunteer Emory next year. Since becoming involved, he has worked with the Jones Boys and Girls Club and led trips clearing invasive species in Morningside Nature Preserve. Currently he is leading a weekly volunteer program walking dogs and humanizing cats at PAWS Atlanta. Daniel was a lead staff member for both Play Day 2008 and Emory Cares Day 2008, and serves as secretary for the Board of Friends of Emory Forest, a group of faculty, alumni, students, and community members devoted to preserving Emory's green spaces. Recently he has become active in the Emory as Place Initiative, volunteering as a Lullwater guide and participating in brainstorming sessions for the Initiative's PlaceFest 2008.

ALICIA FRANCK is Associate Vice Provost in the Office of Academic and Strategic Partnerships at Emory University, and works closely with the Office of the VP and Secretary and the Emory Alumni Association to identify and recruit new leadership for Emory and its boards. Since coming to Emory in 1991, she has served as the Associate

Director of Development at the Emory School of Law, and Director of Regional Programs. In 2002, Franck was promoted to Sr. Assoc. VP of University Development, where she oversaw the alumni relations and development operations for numerous units of the University. In 2004, she was appointed to the position of Sr. Assoc. VP for Principal Gifts. Active in university and civic organizations, she chaired the Emory Center for Women board and currently serves on the President's Commission on the Status of Women. Franck is a 2005 graduate of the Regional Leadership Institute, a member of the Women in Leadership Committee of The Commerce Club, and serves on the boards of Leadership DeKalb and the Council for Spiritual and Ethical Education.

OZZIE HARRIS, II serves as the Senior Vice Provost for Community and Diversity at Emory University. As a senior member of the Provost's Office, Mr. Harris is charged with identifying, creating and advancing efforts that lead to the development of "community," both internal and external, at Emory. Mr. Harris' areas of concern are building community through existing programs and policies on campus, working with academic units and external sources to transfer theory to practice in the Atlanta community, and creating meaningful opportunities for interaction on campus. Towards that end, Mr. Harris guides campus diversity projects, programs and services and directs policies that create a welcoming climate for faculty, staff, students and visitors. Mr. Harris earned his undergraduate degree in English from Dartmouth College and his J.D. from Vermont Law School. He has worked with the Boston Human Rights Commission and with the New Hampshire Public Defender's Office. Before joining Emory in 2007, Mr. Harris served as Special Assistant to the President and Director of the Office of Institutional Equity at Dartmouth College.

GARY HAUK (91G) is Vice President and Deputy to the President of Emory University. For thirteen years he served as Vice President and Secretary of the university, working closely with the Board of Trustees and with three successive presidents. After graduating with a BA in English from Lehigh University in 1974, he studied as a Fulbright student in Romania and later earned an MA in literature and a divinity degree before earning a PhD in ethics from Emory's Graduate Division of Religion. He is the author of *A Legacy of Heart and Mind: Emory Since 1836*, the most recent history of Emory.

MICHAEL LEO OWENS, is the author of *God and Government in the Ghetto: The Politics of Church-State Collaboration in Black America* (University of Chicago Press, 2007). Dr. Owens is an Assistant Professor of Political Science and a Faculty Fellow of Emory's Office of University-Community Partnerships. Along with his teaching and service in Emory's Community Building and Social Change Fellows program, he is a board member of the National Housing Institute and City Hall Fellows. A past recipient of the Urban Affairs Association's Young Scholar Award, Owens has also been a consultant to the Annie E. Casey Foundation, the Pew Charitable Trusts, Ford Foundation, the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development, and the Roundtable on Religion and Social Welfare Policy.

SHANNON PAIGE (09C) is a junior at Emory College. She is a student justice on the Alcohol Review Board, President of Students Promoting Education Among Kids, and a 2007 Community Building and Social Change Fellow, where she worked with the Hollowell Partners on Education and Atlanta Public Schools in an effort to increase community involvement in select group of schools in Northwest Atlanta. She is also a member of Delta Sigma Theta Sorority, Inc; a public service organization. After graduation, she will join the Teach for America Program but aspires to attend law school and be a child advocacy lawyer.

SUSAN PAVLIN spearheads the Refugee Family Services refugee public policy and education initiative. Additionally, Pavlin has worked with the Georgia Department of Human Resources, Refugee Health Program, and Bridging Refugee Youth and Children's Services providing policy guidance on emerging immigration issues and international foster care/unaccompanied minor programs; coordinating refugee youth needs assessments and pro-

viding Title VI trainings for Cultural Competency Workshops. Pavlin is a former Director of Multicultural and Refugee Services for Catholic Social Services, Georgia and Case Manager for the International Rescue Committee, Georgia, and is also the current Chair of the Georgia Advisory Committee on Refugee Resettlement. Pavlin is a graduate of the University of Illinois School of Law, and Vanderbilt University.

ALICIA PHILIPP (75C) is president of The Community Foundation for Greater Atlanta, Inc., one of the largest and fastest growing philanthropic service organizations in the country. Under her leadership, The Community Foundation has grown from \$7 million in assets in 1977 to almost \$800 million today and facilitates more planned gifts than any other locally based nonprofit organization in the Southeast. The Foundation works directly with donors and their families to discover their philanthropic passion, supports nonprofits in the 23-county service area through grants and guidance, collaborates with community leaders and other partners to create innovative solutions to tough issues, and builds an endowment that will benefit the region for generations to come. Philipp has served as a board member of the Council on Foundations, the Southeastern Council of Foundations and Independent Sector. She currently serves as a board member of Central Atlanta Progress and is a member of the Junior League, the International Women's Forum and the Academy of Women Achievers.

MARIANNE SCHARBO-DEHAAN, (75N) joined the Emory Faculty in the Nurse Midwifery Program in 1982 after spending five years in private practice. After 18 years on the midwifery faculty, she retired and joined the CDC in the Division of STD Prevention, working to develop a curriculum focusing on STDs for medical and nursing programs. Currently she is an adjunct professor in the Department of Women's Studies at Agnes Scott College, where she teaches on Women's Health. This past fall, under the auspices of the Emeritus College and the Institute for Developing Nations, Marianne traveled to Addis Ababa University in Ethiopia, where she taught a three week course to Ethiopian midwives enrolled in the first Master's in Nursing Program in the country. She served as Chair of the Advisory Board of the Center for Women at Emory and is currently serving as a community member on that Board. She also chaired the Board of the Feminist Women's Health Center and served on the Board of Men Stopping Violence.

DANNY SHOY, JR. (95C) is a program officer with The Arthur M. Blank Family Foundation. He has worked for several national and local community service organizations including Hands On Atlanta, City Year and the Atlanta Outward Bound Center. Danny currently serves on the Grantmakers for Education national board, the Southeastern Network of African Americans in Philanthropy (SNAAP) organizing board, and the Emory Alumni Board. He is on the Community Foundation for Greater Atlanta's Managing for Excellence Advisory Board. Danny is a graduate of the 2003 Hull Fellows program for emerging leaders in philanthropy and served as chair of the Hull Committee from 2005 - 2007. He is also a 2005 graduate of Leadership Atlanta's LEAD program and was the co-chair of the 2003 National Conference on Black Philanthropy. While at Emory, Danny was a cofounder of ACES (the Association of Caribbean Educators and Students) and was a member of *The Fire This Time* student newspaper.

PHILIP TIZZANI (05OX, 08C) is a senior majoring in International Studies and a peer advisor in the CIPA office. He studied abroad for a semester in Italy at the University of Siena, is part of the student-run Emory initiative "Atlanta Asylum Network", and worked with English language teachers in developing rural communities in Eastern Europe on an UPGRADE grant. As the Atlanta Asylum Network's Director of Undergraduate Advocacy, Tizzani organizes campus events and letter writing campaigns that bring awareness to the institutional inequalities faced by asylum-seekers. Philip has managed cases from clients in the Caribbean and Latin America. After graduation, he will join Teach for America in New Orleans.
