



Internationalization

Accomplishments: September 2008 to August 2009

- Highest numbers ever of international students and scholars at Emory with 1,543 international students (9% increase from previous year), and 1,433 international scholars (11% increase from previous year)
- Increased diversity in undergraduate study abroad (evident in destinations, demographics, and disciplines) by increasing destinations to Africa and Asia. 29% of students studying abroad are minorities (African American, Asian American, Hispanic/Latino, American Indian)
- Through the Emory Tibet Partnership/Emory Tibet Science Initiative, held the First International Conference on Science Translation into Tibetan; and held the first month-long intensive encounter between scientists and educators from Emory University and Tibetan scholars, monks and nuns in Dharamsala, India

Accomplishments: September 2007 to August 2008

- Number of international scholars up 16% to 1281, 83% are health and biological sciences including Yerkes and international students up 17% to 1427, 18% in health and biological sciences
- Highest enrollments ever for study abroad at Emory College's Center for International Programs Abroad (CIPA) with 652 students studying abroad in 2007-2008, up from 639 the previous year
- Institute for Developing Nations (IDN) funded five faculty research workshops and supported a working group on "Gender-based violence and Rule of Law in Liberia", in collaboration with the Carter Center
- IDN-CIPA Scholars Program supported 12 students with scholarship funding for research undertaken in spring and fall 2008 in Senegal, Morocco, Uganda, Vietnam, and India, who later presented their research to President Carter.
- Concluded the successful 3 year term of the Europe, Middle East and Africa (EMEA) international advisory board, with some members moving on to a new international council
- Completed reviews of Office of International Affairs (OIA), The Claus M. Halle Institute for Global Learning, International Student and Scholar Programs (ISSP), Center for International Programs Abroad (CIPA) and Institute for Comparative and International Studies (ICIS.)

Accomplishments: September 2006 to August 2007

- Appointed IDN Director Sita Ranchod-Nilsson, PhD and grew staff; created advisory board, mission and research agenda
- EMEA Board met with Board of Trustees at Emory in Feb 07; events, alumni and outreach activities in Berlin, Dubai, Frankfurt, London, Monrovia, Moscow, Seoul, Tel Aviv, Vienna
- Began working with Emory College on feasibility study for International Center
- International scholars up 3% to 1103; 72% are health science including Yerkes; international students up 6% to 1219; 18% in health sciences
- Upswing in students going to Africa (30 to 41) and to the Middle East (10 to 24) increased participation in faculty led summer programs with increased financial aid



Internationalization

Accomplishments: September 2005 to August 2006

- Developed concept for the Institute for Developing Nations (IDN) in partnership with The Carter Center and achieved consensus as to goals and initial plans, to launch IDN in '06-07 with full participation of Emory community and The Carter Center
- Identified Dobbs Hall as the location for the new International Center
- Created the Europe/Mideast/Africa Advisory Board (EMEA) and held the first two meetings in FY '06, and hired full-time director of external affairs for EMEA
- Strengthened communication among all units, including enhanced ties to Asia with coordination of presidential delegation to South Korea, and enhanced international infrastructure, including moving grad I-20s to GSAS
- Developed Emory's international gateway website for '06-07 launch
